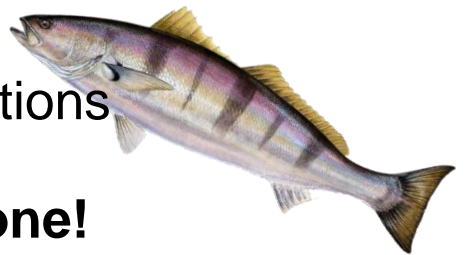

Special speaker, Don Kent, HUBBS_SEA WORLD RESEARCH INSTITUTE (HSWRI) President and CEO will present a fascinating program about stocking additional marine species as part of the Dick Laub Fisheries Replenishment Program. This new initiative by HSWRI parallels the longstanding white sea bass program, and current research efforts are focused on developing tools for stock replenishment of California halibut.

Additionally, Mr. Kent will bring us up to date on growing opportunities to support domestic seafood and his work to establish the first offshore commercial-scale demonstration farm presently being permitted off the coast of San Diego.

This meeting will be a great presentation on a topic that is very relevant to our DPYC Fishing Group and the Dana Anglers. It's a topic, I believe, many club members will be interested in because it relates to the seafood we consume. Very interesting!

Why It Matters

Aquaculture (raising organisms in water) is the practical solution to:

- Renewing regional fish stocks
- Producing a domestic supply of sustainable seafood
- Reducing need for fresh water to produce animal protein

What We Do

Our sustainable seafood program has helped rebuild wild stocks of white seabass. The Dick Laub Fisheries Replenishment Program (DLFRP), a new partnership between resource management agencies, the scientific community, and recreational anglers, is working to do the same with California halibut.

Why It Matters

California Halibut is depleted to less than 20% of its historical levels in Southern California. Replenishment, through releases of cultured fish, is a practical solution to renewing regional fisheries.
